

## LUKE | SESSION 2

### BEFORE THE MEETING

To have a great discussion, every member of the group should read Luke 10–24 ahead of time. That may seem like a lot, but remember to use that time as a way to connect relationally with God. Here's a good plan for reading the chapters:

Day 1: Luke 10:1–37

Day 3: Luke 13:22–14:35

Day 5: Luke 18:15–21:24

Day 2: Luke 10:38–13:21

Day 4: Luke 15:1–18:14

Day 6: Luke 21:25–24:53

### DURING THE MEETING

#### ICEBREAKERS

1. Who is someone you've crossed paths with that exemplifies the word "servant"?
2. How did your reading of chapters 10–24 go?
3. Did anything stand out? Take some time to discuss.

#### Discussion Questions

1. Did the video help you see Luke's gospel in a new way? If so, how?
2. Did chapters 10 through 24 challenge some of your assumptions about Jesus? If so, how?
3. The second half of Luke records many of Jesus' parables (stories that illustrate a theological truth). Why do you think Jesus chose to communicate through stories? How do those stories help you experience truth and apply it in your life?
4. Read Luke 10:25–37 aloud. To which person in the parable do you most relate? How do you think that influences the way you interpret the story?
5. Chapter 11 of Luke contains what's known as "The Lord's Prayer." This was how Jesus taught his disciples to pray. Is there anything in the Lord's Prayer that would be helpful to apply in your prayer life?
6. The video's narrator said, "Only when we submit ourselves to the upside-down kingdom emphasized by the cross can we truly experience the real Jesus." Is there some way in which you need to submit more fully to the kingdom in order to more fully experience Jesus? If so, what can you do this week to submit? How can this group support you?

## WRAPPING UP

We hope you've had some great discussions about the gospel of Luke. We hope you're challenged to apply in your daily life some of what you've learned. We also hope you enjoyed the experience of reading Scripture and want to continue reading it on a regular basis. If so, it may be helpful to try out this three-step process as you read:

- Observation: What does the text say?
- Interpretation: What was the author's original intent?
- Application: What should I do?
